



The Stollery Charitable Foundation held its first Family Granting Meeting in June 2024. The Foundation's board of directors comprises three branches of the founding Stollery family. Each branch of the family was given the opportunity to identify projects or programs led by charities that family members are passionate about and align with the Foundation's values. Unlike traditional grants, Family Grants are director initiated, and do not need to align with the Foundation's traditional geographic mandates (Kamloops, Edmonton, and Vancouver by invitation) and sectoral mandates (social services, health, education, and human rights).

The <i>Right to Health and Healing Program - Phase II</i> supports the mental health and wellbeing of staff at agencies working in sub-Saharan Africa supporting local LGBTIQ communities.	\$ 100,000
ASK Wellness Society: provides outreach, housing, health, education, employment, and emotional support services for marginalized and persons at risk in Kamloops and surrounding areas.	<i>The Maverick Supportive Recovery and Career Development Program</i> provides substance use treatment, relapse prevention planning, life skill support, addictions counselling, peer coaching, and career development opportunities. Renovating the restaurant kitchen on-site will allow ASK Wellness to provide meals for residents and program participants.	\$ 200,000
Mental Health Foundation: fundraises for mental health and addictions programs for Alberta Health Services, Alberta Hospital Edmonton, and community partners.	Kickstand's <i>Integrated Youth Services</i> is a universal access point for young people to receive appropriate inclusive, free, youth-focused, mental health care, with integrated physical healthcare and wrap-around social supports. This award will help support the costs of renovating the Kickstand Edmonton site, which will open in fall 2024 in West Edmonton Mall.	\$ 100,000
Sexual Assault Centre of Edmonton (SACE): supports people impacted by sexual violence and engages communities to promote respect and uphold a culture of consent.	<i>WiseGuyz</i> is a full-year healthy relationships, sexual health, and life skills education program for grade 9 boys that helps prevent adolescent dating violence and challenges attitudes related to homophobia and gender-based violence. Funding will allow the program to expand from eight Edmonton-area schools to 10.	\$ 100,000
FSHD Canada Foundation: funds research to find a cure for Canadians who suffer with facioscapulohumeral muscular dystrophy (FSHD).	Seed funding to develop the FSHD Global Innovation Hub in Calgary, which will launch a 5-year virtual decentralized clinical trial for Albertans with the goal of accelerating FSHD clinical trials and validating emerging biomarkers and digital technologies to help advance FSHD treatments and cures.	\$ 200,000
Zebra Child Protection Centre: serves children and youth who have been impacted by abuse, supporting them through the justice and healing process with a continuum of multi-disciplinary resources.	Support for the <i>Show Your Stripes</i> capital campaign to construct a larger Child and Youth Advocacy Centre in Edmonton that is accessible, more child friendly, and has greater capacity to support the youth and families that have been impacted by abuse.	\$ 200,000
