



The Stollery Charitable Foundation holds semi-annual granting meetings - one in the spring and one in the fall. The chart below outlines the total funds awarded to projects and programs in Edmonton and Kamloops at the Foundation's September 24, 2016 board meeting. While the Foundation does not accept public grant applications from outside of Edmonton and Kamloops, one grant was awarded in Vancouver.
