Kamloops-Cariboo Regional Immigrant Services Society: supports newcomers through integration services in settlement, language, employment and community connections; informs and sensitizes the region on immigration, settlement, and integration, to promote the elimination of racism.	Support for renovations and furnishings in a new programming location for women-centred programming, including the creation of office spaces, a child-friendly area, a library, bathrooms, storage, and a kitchen.	\$	50,000
Schizophrenia Society of Alberta: improves the quality of life for those affected by schizophrenia and psychosis in Alberta through education, support programs, housing, public policy, and research.	Purchase new furnishings at the <i>Iris Court</i> assisted living location in Edmonton, including a dining table and chairs, computer desk and chair, living room chairs and side tables, ottomans, foyer chairs, a smart TV, and mattresses.	\$	26,000
The MacEwan University Foundation: raises funds to support projects and programs at MacEwan University.	Support for programs and activities of the <i>Centre for Sexual</i> and Gender Diversity, as well as support for the 2024 Community Pride Day at MacEwan, a national Community Queer History Conference in Edmonton, and a premier screening of the Vriend v. Alberta documentary.	\$	50,000
Adaptabilities Association of Alberta: serves individuals with special needs and their families by delivering year-round programs, in-home programs, summer camps, and online programs at multiple locations in Edmonton	Funding to renovate and furnish a new programming location in Edmonton's Millwoods neighbourhood. This new facility will help alleviate client wait lists and will offer full-day programming, evening and weekend respite, <i>Social Nights</i> , <i>Community Connect</i> , and <i>Hearts in Action</i> camps (summer, spring break, winter break, PD days).	\$	100,000
Covenant House Vancouver: serves youth in Vancouver experiencing homelessness and protects and safeguards all youth in need.	Support hiring five additional staff members to meet growing demand for the <i>Rights of Passage</i> program, which supports youth ages 16-24 transitioning to independent living by providing them with an affordable, self-contained suite, and whole-person care while they pursue education or employment with a goal of achieving independence. Edmonton Seniors Coordinating Council: brings people, ideas, and information together to build collaborative approaches to services, supports and circumstances affecting older adults (55+) in Edmonton.	Support the creation of a Training Framework for the Edmonton-wide <i>Seniors Coordinated Outreach</i> pilot project and deliver the first and second-year training to 34 staff at 12 partner agencies. <i>Seniors Coordinated Outreach</i> is a shared model for seniors' outreach services across service providers in Edmonton, making service access easier and more consistent for those that need it.	\$	90,500
Royal Alexandra Hospital Foundation : inspires community support for the Royal Alexandra Hospital and its exceptional patient care across the medical spectrum. The Foundation works closely with the staff, leadership, and management of the hospital toward improving the lives of all Albertans.	Launch the <i>Clothing Patients for Discharge</i> project in collaboration with the Royal Alexandra Hospital Foundation (RAHF), the social work team at the Royal Alexandra Hospital, and Goodwill. This three-year pilot program supports patients during their hospital stay and upon their discharge. It is designed to ensure patients have what they need beyond hospital walls, so they can recover in the best way possible.	\$	150,000
Y.E.S.S.: Youth Emergency Shelter Society : provides immediate and low-barrier 24/7 shelter, a drop-in resource centre, temporary supportive housing, temporary independent cohort housing, and individualized wrap-around supports for young people aged 15–24.	Create a <i>Health and Safety Officer</i> role, which will oversee and coordinate the safety program and parallel initiatives to ensure the well-being and safety of youth, staff, and visitors.	\$	80,000
The Governors of the University of Alberta: discovers, disseminates and applies new knowledge through teaching and learning, research and creative activity, community involvement and partnerships, with an international reputation for excellence across the humanities, sciences, creative arts, business, engineering and health sciences.	Upgrade the technology in multiple spaces within the <i>Stollery</i> <i>Executive Development Centre</i> in order to be hybrid- compatible and more accessible to student audiences. The <i>Stollery Executive Development Centre</i> is located on the fifth floor, atop the Business Building.	\$	219,200
Edmonton Down Syndrome Society: benefits people with Down syndrome and their families by providing information and support, facilitating services, and promoting inclusion through public awareness and advocacy, in collaboration with community partners.	Support to hire fulltime <i>Program Manager</i> will oversee and expand the existing program offerings and create new, innovative group programs to help serve more people.	\$	40,000
Lookout Housing and Health Society: provides low-barrier housing and support services to adults in Metro Vancouver, the Fraser Valley, and Vancouver Island with low or no income, who have few housing or support options.	Support for the <i>Pre-Employment and Training Program</i> in Vancouver, which provides personalized skill-building and on- the-job training for individuals who face complex barriers to employment, such as poverty, homelessness, mental health conditions, substance use, literacy challenges, and trauma.	\$	45,900
Canucks Autism Network Society: provides programs for individuals on the autism spectrum and their families, while promoting acceptance and inclusion through community engagement and training initiatives across BC and beyond.	Provide persons in Kamloops on the autism spectrum with safe and suppotive access to sports, through its Swim , Active , Multisport , Skate , and Gymnastics programs.	\$	30,000
Ballet Edmonton Society: commissions original work each season, is committed to advancing the work of diverse creators, and provides education and outreach to demonstrate how dance can positively influence others as a tool for fitness, inclusion, and well-being.	Support to expand the <i>Art Connects</i> program, which offers accessible, therapeutic dance activities to individuals with disabilities, progressive diseases, rehabilitative needs, and social challenges.	\$	30,000
Hoarding Disorder Foundation of Alberta: provides compassionate, informed, collaborative supports and services for people who struggle with hoarding behaviours and their loved ones.	Funding to implement year one of its new fund development plan which includes establishing collaborative partnerships, seeking multi-annual grant funding, developing communications, undertaking donor research, and implementing an annual giving program to build capacity.	\$	64,500
