



The Stollery Charitable Foundation holds semi-annual granting meetings - one in the spring and one in the fall. The chart below outlines the total funds awarded to projects and programs in Edmonton, Kamloops, and Vancouver at the Foundation's October 6, 2024 board meeting.

University of Alberta: Edmonton's largest post-secondary institution, with an international reputation for excellence across the humanities, sciences, creative arts, business, engineering and health sciences.	Top up the <i>Robert and Shirley Stollery Bursary Fund</i> to ensure that the bursaries awarded to financially vulnerable students continue to have a material impact on the affordability of their post-secondary education.	\$ 400,000
Mental Health Foundation: fundraises for mental health and addictions programs for Alberta Health Services, Alberta Hospital Edmonton, and community partners.	Kickstand's <i>Integrated Youth Services</i> is a universal access point for young people to receive appropriate inclusive, free, youth-focused, mental health care, with integrated physical healthcare and wrap-around social supports. This multi-year commitment will help fund the operating costs of the Kickstand Edmonton site, which will open in winter 2024-25 in West Edmonton Mall.	\$ 300,000
Edmonton Symphony Society / Winspear Centre: provides symphonic music and music-based programming to the citizens of Edmonton and the surrounding area.	Support community and educational programming spaces as part of The Winspear Expansion, which adds over 50,000 sq.ft. of new space and converts existing spaces into programming areas.	\$ 250,000
Zebra Child Protection Centre: serves children and youth who have been impacted by abuse, supporting them through the justice and healing process with a continuum of multi-disciplinary resources.	Support for the <i>Show Your Stripes</i> capital campaign to construct a larger Child and Youth Advocacy Centre in Edmonton that is accessible, more child friendly, and has greater capacity to support the youth and families that have been impacted by abuse.	\$ 200,000
Edmonton Community Foundation: endowed community foundation that funds local charities based on the interests of donors and the needs of the community.	Replenish the <i>Stollery Small Grants Fund</i> , which is used to respond to smaller, urgent needs in Edmonton and Vancouver throughout the year.	\$ 190,211
St. Stephen's College: an independent college affiliated with the University of Alberta that offers graduate programs that educate the whole person for service in the public sphere.	Replace the College's 70-year-old roof and complete Phase I of its multi-phase window replacement project.	\$ 175,000
University of Alberta: Edmonton's largest post-secondary institution, with an international reputation for excellence across the humanities, sciences, creative arts, business, engineering and health sciences.	Create a system called <i>CUP Connect</i> , which will offer Edmonton's social-service agency leaders an accessible, streamlined way to connect with researchers and university resources, with the goal of helping each leader understand their organization's needs and make data-informed decisions to improve programs and policies.	\$ 160,000
Pilgrim's Hospice Society: provides supportive and compassionate family-centred care to enhance the quality and dignity of life for those diagnosed with a progressive, life-limiting illness as well as support those who are bereaved.	Install a roof and shingles to the existing wood framed veranda at the The Roozen Family Hospice Centre to provide sheltered outdoor space for patients and staff.	\$ 76,500
iHuman Youth Society: amplifies the creative expression of marginalized young people, addresses their needs and amplifies their voices.	Capacity building support for the LiNKs Mental Health Clinic to implement a digital case management system; enhance clinic facilities; and provide staff training on trauma-informed care, harm reduction, and culturally sensitive practices.	\$ 75,500
Boyle Street Community Services: currently has 40 programs across 9 sites with a goal to end homelessness in Edmonton through prevention and intervention.	Expand the <i>Satellite ID Program</i> by opening two new satellite ID clinics at partner agencies, in order to provide access to ID services for vulnerable Edmontonians outside of the downtown core.	\$ 75,000

YWCA of Edmonton: advances the wellness and growth of women, girls, and families, serving over 9,000 people annually in the Edmonton area with counselling services, pregnancy services, disability services, camps, programs for teen girls, and sexual wellness and education.	Support to hire a counsellor with specialized high-risk counselling expertise to meet the rising demand for high-risk domestic violence support.	\$ 60,000
Edmonton Meals on Wheels: delivers freshly prepared meals in person to individuals with barriers to food security.	Purchase a new minivan for use in daily meal delivery.	\$ 55,000
The Citadel Theatre: one of Canada's largest theatres, offering an 11 production theatre season, provides community theatre programs for all ages, and develops new plays and musicals.	Fund the <i>Accessible Performance Series</i> during the 2025/26 Season, to ensure access for d/Deaf, Blind or low vision, and neurodiverse audiences by covering the cost of service-provider fees (collaborators, interpreters, audio describers, captioners, activators).	\$ 54,000
Edmonton's Food Bank: provides food to vulnerable people with its Hamper and Snack programs, while finding solutions to the causes of hunger and connecting people to wrap-around supports through the Beyond Food Program.	Discretionary funds to be allocated to areas of greatest need or strategic initiatives.	\$ 30,000
The George Spady Centre: develops and delivers services for treatment and support of individuals with substance-related disorders and dual diagnoses.	Fund the purchase of commercial-grade kitchen equipment for the <i>Medically Supported Detox</i> program.	\$ 45,800
Community Options - A Society for Children and Families: offers an early intervention program for preschool children with diagnosed developmental delays, disorders, and medical diagnoses that impact their ability to successfully participate in traditional classroom and community settings.	Provide operational bridge funding to support occupancy expenses.	\$ 30,000
Indo-Canadian Women's Association: encourages and promotes participation by new Canadians in Canadian society through English and digital literacy classes, domestic violence support referrals, and education/support workshops for seniors.	Contract a part-time Communication Strategist who would be responsible for implementing ICWA's strategic plans for marketing, communications, and audience engagement.	\$ 30,000
SAGE Seniors Association: enhances the quality of life of older persons and their families through information sharing and support.	Support to complete a feasibility study on whether <i>Naturally Occurring Retirement Communities</i> (NORCs) are a viable model for community-based seniors supports in Edmonton.	\$ 25,000
Autism Independent Living Society: supports adults on the autism spectrum to build a sustainable, intentional housing community led by the autistic adults and their allies; and develops leadership, independent living skills, and a sense of belonging for autistic adults who will live in the community.	Support the creation of a resident council toolkit (an operations-manual and instructional manual that can be used by Autism resident council members), purchase Microsoft Office Suite, and establish a social media strategy for the agency.	\$ 23,100
