Big Bear Child and Youth Advocacy Centre: for children, youth and their families who have experienced child abuse the agency minimizes system-induced trauma of being involved in the criminal justice system, mitigates adverse outcomes of child abuse, and enhances longer-term support and overall well-being and functioning for its clients.	Operational bridge funding to cover unfunded operational costs, including 2023/24 administrative salaries, legal expenses, and lease obligations.	\$ 46,700
Chris Rose Therapy Centre for Autism Society: provides services for individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorders, working to empower each individual to achieve their social, emotional, academic and vocational goals. Jewish Family Services: empowers and support people, through service excellence, to overcome life's challenges. Kids Kottage Foundation: exists to ensure every infant and child is kept safe and their families are provided with the resources they need to build a strong and resilient future.	The Digitization Project (Technology Capacity Building) involves the purchase of hardware, database development, and digitizing of the current 20,000+ hard copy files, along with staff training on database entry and usage.	\$ 61,800
Right at Home Housing Society: strengthens communities by building and managing permanent housing that is affordable, safe, and supportive for people facing housing insecurity in Edmonton. Sexual Assault Centre of Edmonton (SACE): exists to support people impacted by sexual violence and engage communities to promote respect and uphold a culture of consent.	Support to renovate the agency's new, larger, and more accessible location on 124 Street.	\$ 60,000
The George Spady Centre Society: provides caring, safe, supportive, non-judgmental, client and family-centered services, and recovery services, grounded in evidence-based practice.	Funding to renovate an empty room in the Housing First Site and create a meeting room and cultural space, and furnish a common area in the Westmount Permanent Supportive Housing site.	\$ 21,100
The Governors of the University of Alberta: aims to create and sustain a vibrant and supportive learning environment that discovers, disseminates, and applies new knowledge through teaching and learning, research and creative activity, community involvement, and partnerships	Funding over three years to support the <i>Pediatric Dental Program</i> which provides free dental care to over 500 vulnerable children in the Edmonton area, while developing the skills of Dental Students to treat pediatric patients throughout their career.	\$ 120,000

Edmonton Community Legal Centre: provides free legal advice, advocacy, information, referral, and support when income poses a barrier to accessing justice.	Financial support over two years to hire an annual articling student to ensure the Social Benefits Advocacy program can maintain an increased capacity to support vulnerable Edmontonians with their AISH appeals.	\$ 126,700
Edmonton Region Immigrant Employment Council: dedicated to ensuring immigrants are welcomed and participate in the economy to their full potential.	Funding to develop online learning modules on successful employment strategies for mentees (internationally trained professionals), mentors, and employers, including highlighting common cultural barriers and practical solutions.	\$ 27,500
On Site Placement Services Association: Provide employment opportunities for individuals with non-profits, corporations, and government agencies; offer relevant training programs to build confidence and self-esteem for long term success and economic benefits to the community.	Replace client resource centre computers and provide frontline staff with new computers.	\$ 36,400
United Way of the Alberta Capital Region: mobilizes collective action to create pathways out of poverty in Edmonton by investing and partnering to break the cycle of poverty; lift people out of poverty, and provide a safety net to support people and families through unforeseen circumstances.	Bridge funding to continue providing essential nutrition to students in socially vulnerable schools on a daily basis through the daily lunch and snack program run by e4c in All in for Youth schools for the balance of the 2023/24 school year.	\$ 55,000
Shock Trauma Air Rescue Society (STARS): an emergency medical service that provides transportation and critical care services to patients who might not otherwise have access to timely, vital care.	Contribution to help purchase two high-fidelity training mannequins in Edmonton to ensure that medical crews are practiced, confident, and skilled, and coordinated in a myriad of critical care procedures and protocols.	\$ 20,000
Royal Alexandra Hospital Foundation: inspires community support for the Royal Alexandra Hospital and its exceptional patient care across the medical spectrum. The Foundation works closely with the staff, leadership, and management of the hospital toward improving the lives of all Albertans.	Support to pilot the Indigenous Cultural Partnership, a collaboration between the Lois Hole Hospital for Women at the Royal Alexandra Hospital and Indigenous-led organizations to foster cultural awareness and demonstrate the importance of Indigenous values, traditions, and knowledge systems as an inseparable part of Indigenous patients' healing journeys.	\$ 65,000
Kamloops Sexual Assault Counselling Centre: supports people who have experienced sexualized violence with support services, counselling, advocacy, education, and prevention activities.	<i>Sexual Assault Crisis Response</i> funding to bridge a shortfall in provincial funding for operational costs and continue to operate the crisis line and hospital accompaniment program.	\$ 55,500
